Essential ingredients for your project

- **A clear mission statement:** One sentence that explains your project's purpose.
- **Project plan:** Timeline, budget, task list, and risk assessment.
- **Stakeholder map:** Who helps you (volunteers, sponsors), who benefits, and who might push back.
- **Communication tools:** Email list, social-media accounts, posters/flyers.
- **Fundraising strategy:** Grants, campus funding, crowdfunding, donations.

- **Tracking system:** Simple spreadsheet or online tool to record progress and outcomes.

Top tips for project success

- **Start early:** Give yourself buffer time for unexpected delays.
- **Stay flexible:** Adapt when things don't go as planned.
- **Celebrate milestones:** Share small wins with your team to keep morale high.
- **Document everything:** Photos, quotes, data—these help with reports and future funding.

Example in action

- *Designed and sold campus-branded reusable bottles to fundraise.*

Outcome: *Waste dropped by 30% around student centers, and the campus union committed to keeping refill stations.*
